From the Editor

It is often very difficult to not feel fear, anger and despair over world and local events this past month: the worst economic meltdown in a generation, the suicidal bailout proposal, the devastating hurricanes, the destructive cries of "Drill,Baby, drill!" that are really saying "Crucify her! Crucify her!"to the earth, the disgusting antics of the presidential campaign, the obvious propaganda of the media, the senseless brutal murder of a disabled young man in Chapel Hill, not to mention all our own personal struggles.

And here we find ourselves in October, in the midst of the season of the Dragon. Rudolf Steiner tells us that in Fall and Spring, the ahrimanic spirits rise up in full force, while in winter and Summer, the luciferic beings are at the fore. If we recall the theological virtues of faith, hope, and charity (love), we see their polar opposites in the ahrimanic vices of fear, despair and hatred (which extreme angers brings). When we realize this, it becomes obvious that if we are feeling fear, anger and despair, we are falling right into Ahriman's trap. We have let him triumph in us. How can we stop these feelings when we are bombarded by them everywhere we turn?

Some ideas that may be helpful: Keep things in perspective. Things are unfolding as they should. This does not mean that one should be complacent, but don't let yourself feel defeated. Recite the *Michaelic Prayer* daily, visualize Light and Love all around the globe daily, remember to keep up your sense of humor-it is the best weapon against Ahriman. He cannot stand it! I often watch the Comedy Channel's The Daily Show and Colbert Report instead of the regular news as a soul remedy. To do this to an extreme, of course, would be luciferic. The media want to keep us in a constant state of fear. Michael Moore pointed this out very aptly in his film "Bowling for Columbine". People tend to buy more when they are scared-they "stock up" on things and they also trust the government more, falsely believing that the government is taking care of them because it is warning us of all the "enemies at the gate" we should fear. A recent book, The Shock Doctrine by Naomi Klein has a very similar theme, and is a "must read" for all Americans who want to know what's really going on, why fear is the worst reaction and what we should really do. Some excellent magazines that build hope and optimism, reporting all the good that is going on in the world, as well as solutions to the problems are: Ode, Yes, Utne, and of course, Anthropsophy's New View. I couldn't make it through the month without them, and highly recommend you subscribe to at least one of these. As far as cultivating the last virtue, Love or Charity, the possibilities are boundless for expressing this on a local, as well as global level. Also, joining in community activities, such as you will see listed in our newsletter helps bolster one's strength. Alone, one can do very little, but together a community can work miracles. In community, we will find the solutions to all the problems that are confronting us now. Don't expect the government to help. It is the Dragon that needs transformation.

One of Anthroposophy's greatest leaders of the past century, Henry Barnes, crossed the Threshold on September 18, 2008 at 10:51 PM in NY. He was 96 years old.

Henry was born in New York City in 1912. He attended Lincoln School of Teacher's College and received a B.S. degree from Harvard College in 1933. Following the suicide of his best friend, Peter Stockton (brother of anthroposophical artist Anne Stockton), Henry began to contemplate life's mysteries and the purpose of his life. The mother of his dead friend told him of a book she had read while pregnant with Peter called *Knowledge of the Higher Worlds*. Following her advice, Henry attended an anthroposophical conference in Spring Valley, NY in 1933.

He was 21 years old. There, he learned about Waldorf Education and decided to enroll in the Teacher Training program in Stuttgart, Germany. While in Europe, he met the love of his life, Christy MacKaye, whom he married on September 5, 1939 in Dornach, Switzerland. From 1935-39 Henry was a class teacher in Michael Hall, England. Because of the War, Henry, Christy and several members of their respective families sailed to New York in June of 1940. Henry taught at the Steiner School in Manhattan for three years, but then entered the US Army, where he served until 1946. He then resumed teaching at the Steiner School, first as a Class teacher and then as a high school History teacher. He taught there until 1977, and served as the Faculty Chairperson for many years. Mr. Barnes was also the General Secretary of the Anthroposophical Society in America from 1974-1991.

Mr. Barnes has authored several books: A Life for the Spirit: Rudolf Steiner in the Crosscurrents of Our Time (1997); Percy MacKaye: Poet of Old Worlds and New (2000) and his crowning achievement for which all Anthroposophists in America are indebted: Into the Heart's Land: A Century of Rudolf Steiner's Work in North America (2005). Henry collaborated with anthroposophical groups all over the country to create this masterpiece, which took four years to complete. It is a fascinating history of the anthroposophical work in America and a must-read for all members. Henry also was the host of a video b Karl Levvin about Rudolf Steiner and his work entitled Dr. Rudolf Steiner and the Science of Spiritual Realities.

Henry Barnes was a legend in his time and will be sorely missed. May his guidance from the Other Side inspire and lead us on to service to Humanity in these troubling times!

We dedicate these two Poems by Arvia MacKaye Ege (1903-1989) to Henry Barnes. Arvia was the daughter of playwright Percy MacKaye and the sister-in-law of Henry Barnes, and a student of Rudolf Steiner in Dornach. She was a poet, biodynamic farmer and founder of Adonis Press and the Rudolf Steiner Educational and Farming Association in Ghent, NY.


She ended her talk with the comment that "if Faust was Goethe's *Gospel*, then The Green Snake is his *Apocalypse*".

Community members gathered for several events over the weekend of Sept 19 – 21 surrounding the first visit of our new priest, Rev. Patrick Kennedy. We are especially happy to let everyone know that Patrick is now assigned as our permanent priest, and will be visiting from the Greater Washington DC/Baltimore congregation every other month.

While here in September, he met with the Steering Committee and learned more about the history of the Chapel Hill affiliate, including information and sharing about the important role our group played in the founding of the Seminary for North America in Chicago. In 1999, the local group was deeply involved in a letter-writing campaign, which we have come to understand was pivotal in convincing the Lenkers (the administrative group of priests for the Christian Community based in

Stuttgart, Germany) that a North American English-speaking seminary would be vital for the future growth of the priesthood. Over the weekend, Patrick also met with individuals for Sacramental Consultations, participated in a potluck and community discussion, gave a public talk on Saturday evening, and celebrated the Act of Consecration of Man on Sunday morning. Kathleen Wright has written a report about his Saturday evening talk, following this article.

- The Chapel Hill Christian Community affiliate cannot exist without the real and sometimes difficult supportive work of a local group of volunteers. Although the Steering Committee is willing and able to oversee this work, others from the community are needed to step forward to help with occasional, but recurrent tasks, such as transportation of the altar, set-up and clean-up of potlucks and gatherings. This is an act of service and a personal commitment to the greater whole.
- We now have more time during priest visit weekends, probably on Friday evenings, for study groups or other activities. Some suggestions from the group were: 1) an ongoing, informal discussion group centered on the theme

"Christian Community 101", where we learn about this Movement for Religious Renewal, the various aspects of the Act of Consecration of Man. This would give members of the group a chance to share their feelings and freely bring up questions; 2) Field trips, such as to the exhibit of the Dead Sea Scrolls in Raleigh; 3) Group viewing of films with important themes; 4) Youth activities.

What are your suggestions?

- Since our community has been without an assigned priest for many years, there has not been much opportunity for religious instruction or even an explanation of basic elements of the sacraments and services. At the Sunday Act of Consecration of Man, Patrick advised us how to properly make the "Sign of the Cross". The priest, as a representative of the Angel of the community, makes a large cross and circle, while the congregation, as individuals, makes three small crosses - one each over forehead, chin and heart.
- Patrick will be visiting again Nov 21-23rd. Please note this date it is a week later than originally planned. Dates presently planned for 2009: 1/16 1/18, 3/13 3/15, and 5/1 5/3. The Steering Committee will be sending out reminders and announcements via our CC Newsletter and the ASNC list-serve. We hope to soon have our own group mail list and website stay tuned! Rev. Kennedy Delivers Lecture : "Participating in Redemption-The Sacramental Impulse and The Michaelic Call to Spiritual Maturity"

On September 20, twenty-one people filled the Eurythmy Room at EWS for Rev. Patrick Kennedy's first lecture for our community. Rev. Kennedy began his talk with words of gratitude to Margit Gratzl and the Congregation for their hospitality and preparatory work for his visit here. He said that he hoped there would be "interpollination" between the Washington Christian Community, where he is permanently stationed. and the community here in Chapel Hill.

Rev. Kennedy then began his lecture by stating that according to the standards of most Christian Churches, the title of his lecture is heretical. His assumption is that we are co-Redemptors with Christ and that our relationship with God *evolves*. This is why we need spiritual renewal. Most religious movements of today have not kept up with the times. Many preach that only Christ can save, and that our relationship with God is unchanging—it is a Parent-child relationship.

Instead, Rev. Kennedy proposed that humanity is evolving by approximately one year of physical age to every 100 years of actual time. In other words, in the year 900, humanity was at the age of 9, the "Crossing of the Rubicon Year"; In 1400 around the time of Luther, humanity entered adolescence, evidenced by Luther's "rebellion against the parent (i.e. the Catholic Church)"; however, Luther was still immature. He believed

that you cannot help yourself or participate in the Redemption with Christ; only God can. In the 1700's, we entered the Age of Enlightenment, with the questioning and intellectuality of a late adolescent. Now we are approaching adulthood and need to realize our responsibility for the earth and respond to the destiny we have been called to do. Ultimately, he said we all have the Destiny of Christ. The earth is suffering because of the actions of humanity. Our spiritual life has consequences for the earth.

Kennedy then pointed out that the earth is unique in all of Creation because only here does death occur. The Spirit must therefore permeate the earth with the tranformative power of Love—to bring about the New Heaven and New Earth. The debate between the Creationists and evolutionists is misplaced. The Bible says that God worked of seven days, then rested— "did he rest on a couch?" Kennedy asks. The Creationists must realize that Angels go through changes and Christ went through changes, especially at Golgotha. Christ was introduced to the Mysteries of the earth, which was real knowledge for the spiritual worlds.

And interesting analogy Patrick gave to the idea that we evolve spiritually was to compare the role of child to parent with an incident: If a child breaks a neighbor's window, the parent assumes responsibility and pays for it (this of course, corresponds to the old Christian view that Jesus does it all for us as far as Redemption goes.); If an adolescent breaks the neighbor's window, the parent tells the adolescent he must come up with a plan to make up for the damage. If an adult breaks his neighbor's window, he immediately pays for the damage himself. Kennedy asks: Why would God want us to remain children? He *wants* us to be independent, mature adults. He used the story of "The Prodigal Son" to show how this idea is present in the Gospels.

In that story, as in life, the young adult must go into the world and endure all manner of hardships and mistakes, that make one strong and wise. Through these struggles, one forges a "new self" and thus becomes a mature adult.

This new self becomes born also through the power of Love, even to the point of the saying in the John Gospel "No one has greater Love than He who lay down his life for his friends." Christ also tells us that he can be born in our hearts, and this happens, says Kennedy during the Act of Consecration of Man. It is the Mission of the Eucharist to awaken the power in Human Souls to become vehicles of Christ's Love.

Some final thoughts that were especially appropriate for these times: Rev. Kennedy spoke of the great fear we are all feeling right now. It is because the media have given us a vision of the entire world. Without electronics, only the Archai would have such vast knowledge. In ancient times, people were only aware of their immediate surroundings, which is all a human being can handle and really do something about. By being bombarded with painful images from all over the globe, we naturally feel overwhelmed—we are not capable of Archai-consciousness! Rev. Kennedy said that we need to ask ourselves: "How can I feel faith and trust"? We need also to take time each day to "block' out all these images, which of course implies daily meditative work.

Rev. Kennedy recommended that we read a book called *Surprised by Hope* by N.T. Wright. It is about how we can transform the world.

Thank you, Rev. Kennedy, for this powerful and inspiring lecture!

Branch Meeting Notes From August 31, 2008, 3:30PM At The Home Of Mark Eisen Submitted by Suzanne Mays

Twenty-two members of the Branch attended the meeting. Board President Peg Carmody moderated.

The Virtue Of The Month ("Courtesy – Tact Of The Heart") and the Calendar of the Soul #21 were recited and a brief conversation centered on these two leading thoughts followed. Rain showers were predicted for the afternoon. Thunder rumbled while the Mood Of The Day for Sunday ("Right Resolve – Judgment") was being read. Messages from distant friends Elaine Upton, Tammy Hughes, Eileen Bristol, and from local friends who could not attend, Eve Olive and Herbert Slapo, were conveyed to everyone present.

A long list of important events for September and October were read and there was a catch up on the various study groups that were reconvening after a summer break. A Contemporary Studies Group that Jon Lyerly and Marlene Joyce leads meets on Fridays and is working with a set of lectures by Rudolf Steiner on *Fall of the Spirits of Darkness*. A new biography study group initiated by Roger Schultz is going to start in northern Durham. Its focus will be on the people one has met and how they formed one into who one is now, rather than on "me, myself, I."

Mark Eisen spoke about the critical issues with medical insurance and fee schedules that threaten the continued viability of his own medical practice. He is currently trying to formulate a new way for families and individuals to pay for health services through his practice. This might include a monthly fee based on family or individual income. He wants to keep his practice to himself and to his patients without any interference from insurance agencies. In his opinion, he is good with the *practice* of medicine, but he needs help with the *business* of medicine. An advisory board of supporters will be setup. Mark would like everyone in the anthroposophical community to be involved and use anthroposophical medicine before going to quick fix modalities such as acupuncture or massage. Anthroposophical medicine saves money. It is the most practical medicine. It brings the spiritual world into activity.

Allan Barenholtz offered that the Temple/Wilton, N.H. farm is an example of covering the economics of an initiative. The budget is thought out and then presented to the community to cover it.

Margaret Heath gave a short report on Bunny Hill. A non-profit corporation and a board of directors is being set up. Michael and Kerry Wiesner are the main people behind this initiative, which is based on Camphill principles. They are interested in buying land adjacent to Infinity Farm, if the family who owns the land decides to definitely sell it. The Wiesners' young son has a seizure disorder and they are now planning for his care when he becomes an adolescent and adult. Bunny Hill may have a workshop attached to it, a bakery, 3 or 4 houses with 10 people to a house. The initiative will be working out of Anthroposophy. Kerry is good at marketing and networking, and has worked with the McMullens in their anthroposophical medical practice in Ann Arbor, MI.

Both Kerry and Michael have been involved with Waldorf Education as well. Questions came up during the Branch meeting about how coworkers will be trained; will there be ongoing professional development of workers, and how can this initiative be more accurately defined and portrayed to the public if it is not a Camphill program? There isn't anything for the local branch to do at this point of time. Marie Nordgren gave a report about the Triangle Home Nursery Association. Most of the nursery programs are filled up and have waiting lists. Teachers meet weekly at Joya Matza's house. Newsletter articles in WECAN (Waldorf Early Childhood Association in N.A.) There are six nurseries with between 10-15 families per nursery.

They have a website: <u>www.trianglehomenursery.com</u>. The programs are spirit, play and nature based. Play and movement are primary. There has been a baby boom for the past 4-5 years.

Last June's branch meeting was briefly reviewed and summed up with the statement that there is a need for social consciousness of the world and locally.

Suzanne Mays reminded everyone that the Branch needs its own building, its own home.

A question was asked of how many people are on the Branch's list-serve. Everyone was advised to think of other people to add to it. Also, a directory needs to be organized, so that more people will come to Branch meetings. Linda Folsom and Kathleen Wright are working on a Branch calendar and will take up this question about the list-serve.

Joy Kwapien announced that Infinity Farm is transitioning into a 100-acre community-owned land.

Renate Wend presented a gift to Roger Schultz. It was meant to be given to him after the fire that destroyed his house and the Branch's library some years ago. The gift was a large rose quartz stone that had special significance to Renate. The stone had been given to her by a woman named "Aunt Bea" in Milwaukee, WS., who had introduced Renate to Anthroposophy some 50 years ago.

The next Branch meeting is October 11, 2008 at 3:30 PM at Linda Folsom's house. There will be a potluck afterwards.

What is Anthroposophy?

Anthroposophy is a human oriented spiritual philosophy that reflects and speaks to the basic deep spiritual questions of humanity, to our basic artistic needs, to the need to relate to the world out of a scientific attitude of mind, and to the need to develop a relation to the world in complete freedom and based on completely individual judgments and decisions.

Anthroposophy can also be called Spiritual Science. As such, it is an effort to develop not only natural scientific, but also a spiritual scientific research on the basis of the idealistic tradition, in the spirit of the historical strivings, that have led to the development of modern science.

Anthroposophy also is an impulse to nurture the life of the soul in the individual and in human society, meaning among other things, to nurture the respect for and interest in other people on a purely human basis, independently of their origin and views.

Various "daughter movements" of Anthroposophy are biodynamic farming, Waldorf schools (see European Council for Steiner Waldorf Schools and the Association of Waldorf Schools in North America for the largest Waldorf schools associations), Anthroposophical Curative Education (see European Council for Curative Education and the Camphill Association of North America) and Anthroposophical Medicine.
